The school's horseriding simulator allows pupils who are physically unable to access horseriding to have this extracurricular sport/physical opportunity, as they are able to be hoisted or supported to climb onto the specially adapted 'horse'. The funding grant has been used to pay for the services of a specialist Riding for the Disabled instructor who, along with school staff who are trained to appropriately move and handle pupils, as well as support them on the horses riding simulator, facilitates these sessions.

Additional comments:

The children who attend Abbey Court School all have Education and Health Care Plans and have either Severe, or Profound and Multiple Learning Difficulties (SLD/PMLD). Additionally, many of the pupils have physical disabilities and/or medical conditions, which can potentially be barriers to their ability to access PE and sports activities (including swimming).

All Primary pupils have had the opportunity to access either swimming/hydrotherapy, and/or Rebound Therapy, and/or sessions on the school's horseriding simulator in this academic year: this includes boys and girls, disadvantaged pupils, and those with SEND and/or longer term medical conditions (with the exception of a very small number of pupils with specific risk assessments which do not allow this, due to their individual complex health needs).

All Primary pupils have had the opportunity to access either swimming/hydrotherapy, and/or Rebound Therapy, and/or sessions on the school's horseriding simulator in this academic year: this includes boys and girls, disadvantaged pupils, and those with SEND and/or longer term medical conditions (with the exception of a very small number of pupils with specific risk assessments which do not allow this, due to their individual complex health needs). More Rebound Therapy and sessions on the school's

	horseriding simulator have been able to be offered, due to the training provided for staff (for Rebound), and the increase in the time bought for the Riding for the Disabled horseriding instructor (for Tonto).
Section 5: Sustainability

Additional comments:

The spending of the PE and sport premium funding on CPD has helped to build capacity within the school to ensure that the improvements made will benefit not only the school's current Primary pupils, but also those joining the school in future years.

The PE Lead has undertaken external training on Halliwick swimming (an approach designed for pupils with Profound and Multiple Learning Difficulties), which has provided him with knowledge, skills and experience to more effectively lead the teaching and learning in swimming across the school. The PE Lead has delivered internal training to all teaching staff (including HLTAs), during Staff Meeting training sessions, on supporting pupils with developing their swimming skills, which has resulted in teachers reporting increased confidence and competence in their own ability to lead swimming sessions. The PE Lead has provided ongoing individual 'drop-in' sessions, individual support and mentoring to teachers, regarding supporting pupils' swimming development, which will continue. The 'upskilling' of teachers' skills in teaching swimming, as a result of this CPD, will have ongoing impact and be sustainable.

Additionally, the Rebound Therapy training delivered by the school's accredited Rebound Therapy trainers to seven members of school staff, has ensured that the staff members are trained to deliver Rebound Therapy sessions for pupils and increased capacity for the number of sessions that can be offered for pupils; these sessions will be able to be continued, delivered by the trained school staff, and therefore the improvements are sustainable.

School staff who have supported pupils during sessions on the school's horseriding simulator (Tonto) have received training on appropriately moving and handling pupils, assisting them to get on/off the 'horse', and appropriate positioning/posture of pupils whilst on the 'horse'. This has been facilitated by the Riding for the Disabled horseriding instructor, through modelling and training during the sessions. Supporting staff members have been able to apply their increased knowledge regarding correct posture and positioning for pupils in the classroom environment (for example, when seated, when using mobility equipment, when sitting on mat on floor, etc.), thereby increasing the impact of these sessions and ensuring some of the physical benefits to pupils are sustainable, beyond the horseriding simulator sessions. Additionally, the parents of at least two pupils have taken their child to access external horseriding activities following their child's sessions on the school's horseriding simulator, providing them with increased opportunities for physical

activity/development outside of school.

Additional comments:

The children who attend Abbey Court School all have Education and Health Care Plans and have either Severe, or Profound and Multiple Learning Difficulties (SLD/PMLD). Additionally, many of the pupils have physical disabilities and/or medical conditions, which can potentially be barriers to their ability to access PE and sports activities (including swimming).

Pupils are taught swimming from year R to year 6. Each pupil swims weekly with their class group, in the school's hydrotherapy pool. For pupils who are assessed to be more able in swimming, they have opportunities to access swimming sessions at a local public leisure centre, to support further progression in swimming skills, water safety and personal independence.

Pupils are assessed against swimming progression skills, including:

• Halliwick Proficiency Tests: red, yellow and green badges (these are designed for pupils with

profound and multiple learning difficulties);

- Ducklings Awards: Ducklings 1-5: designed for pool and water confidence;
- Water Skills Awards: these provide greater challenge for those pupils who are showing confidence in skills and strokes previously achieved.

Additional accreditation is available to challenge the most able pupils further (distance awards and life-saving, for example).

Whilst there is a high level of support in place for pupils to develop their swimming and water safety skills, there were no children within the current year 6 cohort who were able to swim 25 metres, and/or effectively use a range of strokes, and/or be able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations. However, pupils will continue to be supported to develop these skills in the Secondary department at Abbey Court School, through weekly high quality swimming sessions and personalised targets for each child.

More children have been able to access high quality hydrotherapy sessions, as a result of the CPD delivered on supporting pupils during swimming sessions (funded by the PE and Sport premium): this has supported an increase in pupils' physical activity and development, and achievement of relevant Physiotherapy and Occupational Therapy goals identified on Therapy Plans.
