### **Trust Lottery Draw**








The first Trust Lottery Draw of the 2023/24 Academic Year took place on Friday 29th September 2023.

### What is Makaton?

Makaton is a unique language programme that uses symbols, signs and speech to enable people to communicate. It supports the development of essential communication skills, such as attention and listening, comprehension, memory, recall and organisation of language and expression.







### BULGARIAN KUABIIKI










Zdraveĭte! This term, the language of the term is Bulgarian. This has inspired P11 to make Kurabiiki, a sweet Bulgarian cookie.

At Abbey Court, we seek ways to listen to the views of our pupils and involve them in decision-making so that they are engaged as partners in the life of the school. Pupil Voice enables pupils to focus on how to make informed decisions about their lives, their health and well-being, the environment and their future. Each year, Pupil Voice meetings explore three different topics. The meetings demonstrate to the pupils the impact that their voice has on the policies and practices of the school, as well as building the pupil's confidence and self-esteem.





Our focus at the end of last year was: 'How can we develop multicultural learning?' Pupils really enjoyed this focus and had lots of fun exploring the multicultural learning opportunities that we offer. In particular, a huge hit was Joanna and Raminder sharing stories in other languages (and more of this has been requested). A 'Culture Club' has been started at lunchtime as a result of the Pupil Voice meetings, which is very popular. Another big motivator for multicultural learning is when it is centred around music, dancing and

dressing up from different countries and cultures.

New Pupil Voice representatives have been selected for this academic year, with pupils voting who they wished to represent their class. This year, we look forward to discussing 'Community', 'Playtimes and Lunchtimes' as well as 'Our Rights', during Pupil Voice Meetings.

# Class \$7 GO GREEN

The pupils researched the different parks they were visiting and planned their routes using the maps they found. When out at the park, they also used their social sight sign knowledge to help them to navigate, such as pointing out directional arrows to follow routes, as well as the very important café signs!

The weather was unfortunately against us, and so the pupils stayed overnight in the school hall. However, to gain the full D of E experience, they did practice erecting their tents outside on the field, learning how to secure guide ropes as well as putting those tricky tents away again! Some of the pupils wanted to sleep inside their tent in the hall, which was fantastic.

This group of pupils showed a high level of perseverance, resilience and they challenged themselves in ways we did not think possible. As a school, we appreciate that achieving a Duke of Edinburgh Award is difficult, and so we are therefore extremely proud to award the pupils with their well deserved Bronze Expedition Award.


The Primary pupils were focusing on learning how to follow simple instructions, whether that was themselves following instructions from adults, or programming one of their favourite cause and effect toys to move or to make a noise.



Our older pupils were learning about how coding is integral to our everyday lives.

They also used the website, 'Busy Things', to practice their coding when playing online games.







It is an after school club for both local schools' students and Abbey Court students to come together to learn more about animals, farming and share in things that interest and motivate them in their spare time. You need to be 10 years old or above to join. Club members enjoy working on the farm each week, take part in outside activities with other local Young Farmers' groups and have visitors come in to tell them more about the farming world and animals of interest.

Abbey Court have a Young Farmers Club that has been running for a couple of years and during the past term, we have been working hard on team skills, friendships, problem solving, using our initiative and learning about the animals on Larkin Farm and how to keep them healthy.

As groups, we have been working together to complete jobs around the farm like harvesting sunflowers,



thinking about enrichment activities for the animals, cleaning out the pig arc and the chicken coops, how to groom different animals and how to prepare their feeds too. We learn about how to prepare the animals and ourselves for shows, and have attended shows with a range of animals. Our next show is the Kent Cavy Show where we will be taking Squeaky and Nibbles, our guinea pigs!

# How the school's Speech and Language Therapy Team can support your child in school

Welcome back, and a special welcome to our new pupils and families starting their learning journey at Abbey Court this year!

Here at Abbey Court, there are three school employed Speech and Language Therapy team members: Lynsey and Alice, who are Speech and Language Therapists, and Kelly-Ann, who is the school's Speech and Language Therapy Assistant. Alice and Lynsey work part time in school, and Kelly-Ann works full time.

There are many ways that the school's SALT team can support your child, alongside any input from the NHS Speech and Language Therapy Team (based at the Snapdragons Centre).

Not all of the support that is given to your child is direct input (face to face); in fact, the SALT team can have a big impact by supporting the staff who work with your child every day. The SALT team does this by:

- providing input at the Pupil Progress Meetings at the beginning of every big term, setting communication targets and providing ideas to staff about how to achieve them.
- attending Annual Reviews, when appropriate, to discuss targets and achievements of the pupils.
- supporting new staff by providing training in Induction week about different forms of AAC (Alternative and Augmentative Communication) and Dysphagia (eating and drinking difficulties).
- offering best practice advice and demonstrating communication equipment to staff during a regular slot in the staff briefing meetings.
- spending time in classes, demonstrating any communication systems and strategies to the staff team and showing how these can be implemented in the classroom setting effectively. This allows the staff to support your child across the week. This is beneficial as working on targets throughout the week is more effective than a single session every week.
- making communication resources. This includes visual supports, such as timetables and 'now and next' boards, communication boards for topics or places, such as the farm, and making resources for individual pupils, such as communication books and topic boards.

liaising with the NHS Speech and Language Therapists regularly to ensure that the service being
provided is meeting the needs of the children, both from a communication and a feeding perspective.
This includes the local service and the specialist AAC service provided to some students by the KMCAT
team

The school's SALT team also support some students individually. This begins with an observation of the child in their classroom setting to offer advice as soon as possible. If further assessment is needed, the SALT team will take the child out individually to do this and then provide further information and advice for the class team about which strategies and methods are recommended for the pupil.

If it is felt that the child would benefit from some 1:1 sessions to learn a skill, such as a new communication system, the school SALT team would offer the 1:1 sessions for a block of time and then hand back to the class staff to carry on working on the targets.

Sometimes group sessions are offered to pupils; these may cover social skills, using communication books or boards. These offer valuable opportunities for the children to practice using their communication methods with their peers, which can be a better way of improving skills as learning from a peer can be better received than listening to the adult! These groups are full of fun activities and games, giving pupils a chance to practice the skills they need in a relaxed atmosphere.

The school SALT also runs three Parent Workshops across the academic year, covering a range of topics – we look forward to seeing some of you at the next one on Monday 27th November 2023.

As you can see, there is a lot of behind the scenes working from the school's SALT team to support your child on their communication journey here at Abbey Court School.



### **Attendance Matters - Missing School Means Missing Out!**

**Every child has a right to Education (Article 28, United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child).** At Abbey Court School, the expectation is that pupils achieve <u>at least 95% attendance</u> at school every year. We work very closely with the Local Authority and the Attendance Advisory Practitioner (AAP) to monitor and improve pupil attendance.

The overall attendance of pupils at Abbey Court School is currently 90.1% for Term 1.

Missing school means missing out – this is a simple but very important message.

Missing out soon adds up. 90% attendance means that a child has missed either one morning or afternoon of school every week. Throughout their 12 years of compulsory education, a Medway pupil can lose out on more than a whole year of education, if their attendance is 90% every year.

Family holidays in term time can have more of an effect than parents realise. Two weeks off in each school year for 12 years is equal to missing two full terms of education, which will have a negative impact on children's success at school and seriously affect their future.

Headteachers are not obliged or expected to authorise absence from schools by pupils, including family holidays, except in the most serious and exceptional circumstances. Requests for pupils' absence are dealt with individually and only after the parents/carers have made a written request to the school. The school requires 14 days to consider a request. The Headteacher will send a letter to the parents/carers to inform them if the leave of absence request is authorised or declined.

By law, only the Headteacher can approve absence, not parents.

### **Penalty Notices**

If parents decide to take their child/ren on a leave of absence, despite being informed the absence will be unauthorised, a Penalty Notice may be issued to each parent/carer who has day-to-day responsibility for the child. Parents must pay £120 for each pupil within the household within 28 days, reduced to £60 if paid within 21 days. Failure to pay within 28 days will lead to prosecution. There is no right of appeal by parents against a penalty notice.

Penalty Notices may also be issued to each parent who fails to ensure their children's regular attendance at school.

### **Reporting Pupil Absence**

If your child is unwell or is unable to attend school, please contact the school office before 9.30am to report the absence and explain the reason for this. It is the parents/carers' responsibility to do this on each day of the absence.

We understand that some pupils at Abbey Court may have high numbers of medical/dental appointments because of their complex medical needs. Please let the school know if your child needs to attend an appointment during the school day, and provide the school with sight of an appointment card or letter. Where possible, please make medical/ dental appointments outside of school hours and send your child to school before/after the appointment.

### Lates

Any pupil arriving at school after 9.15am will be recorded as being 'Late' to school, and will need to be signed in in the 'Pupil Movements Book' at Reception. Pupils who have 6 late sessions recorded will be referred to the AAP.

At Abbey Court School, we regularly review individual pupil attendance. If your child's attendance falls below 90% or they have any unauthorised absences which we are concerned about, we will write to you and/or invite you in for an Attendance Clinic meeting, so we can talk about any issues affecting your child's attendance, and what support may be needed to improve this.

Please contact the school if you feel you require any additional support with your child's attendance.



### Online Safety Tips For Children



Donts



Only share it with people you know like friends and family. Ask a trusted adult, like your teacher or a family member, to help you change your privacy settings so that strangers can't see it.

SPEAK POLITELY AND BE KIND TO OTHERS WHEN YOU SPEAK TO THEM ONLINE

Treat them like you would treat them in real life and always remember your manners.

TELL A TRUSTED ADULT IF YOU ARE BEING BULLIED ONLINE

If other another person is sending you nasty messages, a trusted adult will be able to help you collect evidence and report the person to the relevant authorities.

USE PASSWORDS TO PROTECT YOUR PERSONAL INFORMATION

Ask a trusted adult to help you create a password that you can easily remember but which is hard for other people to guess.

5 ALWAYS CHECK WITH A TRUSTED ADULT FIRST BEFORE USING A DEVICE OR DOWNLOADING A NEW APP

This is so that they can check it is safe for you to use and make sure the privacy settings are right.

TELL A TRUSTED ADULT IF YOU SEE SOMETHING ONLINE WHICH YOU DON'T LIKE

This can include anything that upsets you, makes you feel sad or which you're unsure about.

JUSE THE INTERNET TO HAVE FUN AND TO HELP YOU FIND OUT INFORMATION ABOUT THINGS

Remember to ask your trusted adult for help and always use child friendly search engines so that the information you get back is safe.



ACCEPT FRIEND REQUESTS FROM STRANGERS OR PEOPLE YOU DON'T KNOW

Always tell a trusted adult if somebody you don't know tries to contact you online.

SPEND TOO MUCH TIME ON YOUR DEVICE

Instead, go out and play with your friends, get some fresh air and try to exercise more. This will help you stay fit and healthy.

3 REPLY TO MESSAGES FROM ONLINE BULLIES OR PEOPLE WHO SEND YOU NASTY MESSAGES

The most important thing to do is to tell a trusted adult and then block the person from contacting you.

COPY PEOPLE'S WORK ONLINE OR PRETEND IT IS YOURS

This is called plagiarism and can get you into a lot of trouble.

BE MEAN OR NASTY ONLINE


Behave online like you would in real life and don't post anything that can make you look like a bad person. Things that you post online can stay there for a very long time.

USE YOUR DEVICES CLOSE TO BEDTIME

This will allow your brain to rest so that you can get a good night's sleep, stay focused at school and perform better in class.

SHARE PERSONAL INFORMATION ON THE INTERNET WITH STRANGERS

Always tell a trusted adult if somebody you don't know asks you for your personal information.
