



# VOICE Pupil Voice

Pupil Voice groups meet termly at Primary, Secondary and FE to discuss topics that are important to them. This provides pupils with the opportunity to express their opinions and to come up with any ideas to improve what we do at Abbey Court. Our Pupil Voice meetings are already up and running this year, with new class representatives being selected, and discussions on our first topic well underway.

The areas of focus this year are:

Autumn Term — Mental Health and Wellbeing / ELSA

Spring Term — Learning Outside the Classroom

Summer Term — Inclusion and Outreach





At our Pupil Voice meetings, we encourage pupils to become active participants, developing skills that underpin their right to have an opinion and communicate these effectively and at a level appropriate to them.

'Pupil Voice' is embedded into the curriculum, with teaching and learning activities being used to enable pupils to focus on how to make informed decisions about their lives, their health and well-being, the environment, and their future.





## Reading and Writing





S5 have been practising their reading and writing skills in a variety of settings across the school. Have a look at some of the ways we have done this:

- We have read signs to navigate around the school and deliver messages.
- We are learning German words at snack-time.
- We have also read symbols in our lessons to help us understand things more easily.
- We read about Larkin Farm on the school website and learnt about the farm rules on a specially made poster.
- We have also used the E-Tran Board to tell adults and peers how we feel.









## Learning Through Colours

S1 have been investigating colour and shape. As well as developing their fine motor skills and demonstrating engagement in their learning, pupils have named colours and completed coloured shape puzzles. Some have sorted colours into their groups and completed colour patterns by threading the correct coloured buttons onto a string, or copied an adult's cotton reel pattern. A few pupils have engaged with the adults to explore colours through light and sound.

In addition, some pupils have used their developing knowledge of colour to demonstrate how mixing different colours can lead to creating a new colour, and in some cases being able to recreate this from memory. We have explored the landmarks that you may see along the way, researched the distance of the marathon, and then measured the school field to see how many laps we would have to complete in order to run a marathon.



### ATTENDANCE MATTERS



#### New statutory guidance is out!

#### `Working Together to Improve Attendance August 2024`

Schools, parents, local education authorities, and the wider community all have a role to play in ensuring a child's attendance at school is good, and to support improving attendance where this is needed.

At Abbey Court, our pupils have a full and varied curriculum where learning, structure, routine, social interaction, communication, experiences and friendships are explored and developed. All are crucial to their overall development and wellbeing so any time out of school does mean they miss out.

#### Please support your child's attendance so they don't miss out

In line with our Attendance policy, your child's attendance should be at least 90%.

We know that sometimes your child can be unwell and this can impact their attendance, however, 90% is generally achievable for most of our children.

Often children with sniffles, colds or tummy aches still enjoy being in school and taking part in all the learning and social activities offered throughout their day. Unless they are extremely poorly, have an underlying health condition, or an illness requiring them to be off for 48 hours, such as vomiting or diarrhoea, please continue to send them to school. We will call you if we have concerns about your child being unwell when in school.

When your child is unable to attend due to illness, please call the school on the first day of absence. Where illness continues, please keep us regularly updated and also provide evidence of prescription medication or medical/hospital letters/appointment cards. This helps us to understand the context of your child's absence.

If you believe there are 'exceptional reasons' for your child to take leave during school time, you must complete an absence request form, available from the school office, and send it to the Headteacher two weeks in advance of the leave. A Headteacher is only allowed the discretion to authorise an absence if they believe there are exceptional circumstances and they will decide whether the absence is authorised or not.

We regularly review attendance and where your child's attendance falls below 90%, we may write to you, or invite you in for a meeting to talk about what support might be needed to improve your child's attendance. We also work closely with the Local Authority Attendance Advisory Service to monitor and improve pupil attendance where needed.

Headteachers have the right to issue a Penalty Notice, which is an out of court settlement that can cost up to £160 and they will issue a Notice to Improve before this point. Clearly, we want to avoid this and work with you to ensure your child's attendance is as good as it can be at all times. We welcome your support with this.

# Horseriding







Pupils from Reception through to Further Education have access to Tonto, our mechanical horse. Pupils can steer and jump Tonto, whilst they ride around different locations such as the zoo, a farm and the beach.

Pupils can communicate what they would like to do through objects of reference, symbols, sign language and verbal communication.

We also attend horseriding sessions at The Arrow Riding Centre, where pupils can apply all of the skills they have developed with real horses.

# **Communication Corner**

An 'object of reference' is a way of supporting our pupils with routine and transitions throughout the school day. They are useful for pupils that have a multisensory impairment, or struggle to follow verbal instructions.

Objects of reference are items that have a special meaning attached to them. They can represent anything that words can such as places, people and activities.

We use objects of reference in lots of ways at school. We can use them in a timetable form to let someone know what is happening, and we also use them to help with transition around the school.

If you have visited school, we have our object of reference boxes in key locations around the school which look like this.

The pupils are given the matching object from an objects of reference bag. The pupil then explores and holds onto the item while they are transitioning from class to the location. The pupil would then be encouraged to match the items and drop the one they were holding into the box at the bottom. This indicates they have reached the right location.

The red button on the box is a recorded message that can be activated to give the auditory feedback about the location and would simply say the name of the location. If you have any questions, or want more information about anything, then contact me via the contact book or the office.

Remember to always say the word when you are Makaton signing. Use your dominant hand to sign slowly and to the length of the word.




#### What is Makaton?

Makaton is a unique language programme that uses symbols, signs and speech to enable people to communicate.

It supports the development of essential communication skills, such as attention and listening, comprehension, memory, recall, and organisation of language and expression.
