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
What is Makaton?

Makaton is a unique language programme that uses symbols, signs and speech to enable people to communicate. It supports the development of essential communication skills, such as attention and listening, comprehension, memory, recall, and organisation of language and expression.





Class P2 - On The Farm




"This term I have enjoyed going to Strood swimming pool it is a bit cold but once I put my shovlders under it felt warmer.

Further Education Work Experience



Each week, all our FE students undertake work experience in the community, to help them to develop functional life skills, and contribute to enterprise projects for charity fundraising. Their experiences are in a variety of settings; this has recently included Age UK. The students have been socialising with the elderly people and helping them by handing out items for bingo. In addition, they have been working to improve the Age UK environment by planting pots with bulbs and clearing the garden area for the visitors.

At Broomhill Park, our young people support the Friends of Broomhill charity by litter picking and pruning back vegetation, to improve the local environment. At our farm, FE students take great pride in taking part in the daily upkeep and caring for the animals, vegetables and plants.

Within their own environment in the FE Department, students sort, tidy, clean, wash, shop and cook. Students have been learning about the needs of wildlife and what would improve their habitat by making wooden shelters for them. As part of their enterprise work, students get involved in planning, designing and making crafts to sell. This is a great opportunity for confidence building for all of the students. Finding out about their personal interests and skills helps prepare them to make choices in their careers and future work as volunteers in their community.





KS2 Off Site Horse Riding

Over the past term, six pupils from KS2 have been going to Mierscourt Valley Riding School in Rainham for horse riding sessions. Each session starts with the pupils preparing for their ride by being fitted with a riding hat and putting on their wellington boots. Pupils spend some time grooming the horses and learning about basic pony care.







The horses are then saddled and led up to the paddock, where the pupils mount the horses using

the correct technique; from the left of the horse, putting their left foot in the stirrup and lifting themselves on. The pupils have been learning how to hold the reins correctly and use them to steer the horse around the paddock and cones. The pupils then trot the horses around the paddock, supported by the Mierscourt Riding School staff.








KS3 Off Site Horse Riding



At the start of November, the secondary pupils began attending their weekly horse riding sessions at the Arrow Riding School in Dartford. In their first two sessions, the pupils learnt how to mount and dismount a horse safely, how to sit on the horse and how to make the horse go by saying or Makaton signing the words, 'Walk on'. The pupils have made great improvements in their riding skills, and are now able to ride over obstacles and also ride the horse using just their feet, not holding on with their hands (as you can see in the photographs)!



In P3, we have been learning about Diwali, which is a Hindu festival. In one of our Design & Technology lessons, we have made coconut burfi with our EAL Assistant, Raminder. We all pressed the switch independently to listen to the pronunciation of the Indian words for the ingredients.



We explored the different ingredients with our senses and then worked together to weigh out the ingredients and cook the sweet treat. Once we had cooked the coconut burfi, we left it to cool and then carefully cut it and tasted it. We all loved the burfi and enjoyed trying a new food!



Class S10

In Class S10, as part of our learning about Diwali, we went on an Educational Visit to Morrisons in Strood and bought some Indian food, including onion bhajis and vegetable pakoras. We thought they were delicious!

Back in school, we smelt some incense sticks and Indian spices. We explored some Indian music, dancing, clothes and jewellery, more about the Diwali Festival and how this is traditionally celebrated.

We also created some Rangoli and fireworks artwork.



During an assembly about the festival of Diwali, pupils listened to the story about Rama and Sita and the traditions associated with this festival, and also enjoyed some Bollywood dancing!

Pupils had a chance to make the Dandiya sticks, clay lamps which are called Diyas, and created Rangoli patterns. Some pupils even experienced henna on hands!



History

Class P4 Florence Nightingale



This term, our topic has been 'Florence Nightingale'. In our Art and Design lessons, we have been studying her portrait and worked hard to recreate her silhouette. Pupils were able to use light to trace her image, and tea bags to create a vintage effect to their artwork. The final products really are all masterpieces!














In Class P5, as part of our learning about Florence Nightingale, we have enjoyed exploring the jobs of doctors and nurses through role play and drama activities! The pupils have been very helpful to a 'poorly' adult, practicing their nursing skills! They have taken temperatures, used the stethoscope and wrapped a bandage around the injured area! Some pupils have transferred this skill when playing with teddies or dolls. The pupils also took a trip to the Nurses' Room at school to explore the different equipment that nurses use nowadays. The pupils weighed themselves and measured their height.





Class P12

As a school, Abbey Court always commemorates Remembrance Day and classes make individual poppies or a wreath to share as part of a school assembly. The pupils have previously discussed the meaning of the colours associated with the poppy and were all able to name them using their voices, symbols or by pointing.



However, this year, P12 wanted to lay the wreath at an actual memorial and so we visited the Chatham Naval War Memorial site. The pupils were extremely interested in

what they saw and were able to identify the equipment being held by each of the sailor statues. The pupils were very respectful when laying their wreath, and they were all able to wait quietly for one minute, as we paid a tribute of our own to the brave men and women who lost their lives or were injured during previous conflicts. This term, as part of S5's History lessons, we have been learning about World War Two, to support the pupils to understand the importance of this, and why it is important to remember the service personnel who fought and died in war. To do this, they made some poppy wreaths, visited the Royal Engineers' Museum in Gillingham and then went to the Naval War Memorial in Brompton. Whilst there, the children were able to be silent for a few moments whilst they were laying the poppy wreaths. Class S2 have been working on the AQA Award in 'Animal Husbandry: Poultry'. For this award, the pupils had to identify feed for the chickens, give them fresh water, provide fresh food and collect eggs. We are very proud of our 'LadyBug' Hotel and can't wait to meet all of the bugs who stay here!



Our FE students work really hard on the farm to practice and learn new skills. They work well to keep the animals clean, groomed, fed and happy, and we really appreciate all their hard work on the farm.

One student, in particular, has been showing real strength in practical work and helped to clean out the pig arc, which is where the pigs snuggle up together to sleep. It had become damp and a little muddy due to the wet weather. He was able to collect his own tools and follow instructions alongside Tom, our farm assistant, to complete the important job.

When the pigs were let into the arc with the fresh straw and hay, they absolutely loved it and were rooting around, in their element. The student was very proud of himself with his achievement and that he had made the pigs comfortable and happy. In the warmer weather, we clean the arc out every three to four weeks, but in the winter with the undesirable wet weather it needs to be done weekly!



The New Library and Community Hub in FE!

FE have enjoyed visiting and working in our new Library and Community Hub. It has been designed to be a modern learning environment that gives our pupils the freedom and independence to develop and apply a range of reading and functional literacy skills. Students have been visiting the Library and Community Hub as a part of their ASDAN work on developing their communication skills, including reading and sharing preferred genres of books. One group has been working alongside a careers' advisor, discussing options for their futures by using the computers in the Hub to research whilst working on our individual targets. I loved how you reimagined Shakespeare's 'The Tempest' and made it your own. The concept was brilliant, setting the isle as a rock music loving Gravesend. It was great as Prospero conjured up the storm, drawing the band's tour bus, emblazoned with 'Acers On Tour', into this new place. Setting the play in the town you were performing in created an immediate connection with the audience.

I really enjoyed your confident use of your voices to tell this story in many different ways. Highlights included the brilliant call and response as Antonio, Alonso, Stefano and Ferdinand asked 'Where are we?' and the rest of the performers replying 'Gravesend'. I also enjoyed you combining character dialogue with narration that guided us through the story, and when, with placards in hands you chanted 'Get Prospero Out!'. You also used some great whispering and cheering in your reactions!

It was very effective how you portrayed the changing weather with characters wiping their brows under the heat of the hot sun and then running to get out of the thunderstorm. This emphasised the magical forces at play in your Gravesend. During the wedding of Miranda and Ferdinand the mood was created beautifully as performers became swaying hearts, showing us all that love was in the air! The audience also really enjoyed your joyous 'La Bamba' dance.

You had some fantastic costumes, with the characters' names emblazoned across the back. I also loved your brilliant props which you handled professionally, including your tour bus which really gave the effect that you were travelling on the road. 
