Chatham Dockyard





On 30th October, pupils from Key Stages 3 and 4 visited Chatham Historic Dockyard, as part of their Discovery Project.

The pupils had a fun packed day building and launching rockets at a warship! They worked in pairs with adult support to roll, tape and stick their rocket together, before pumping air into a tube and pressing the 'fire' button to launch their rocket. There was lots of laughter, and it was quite competitive, too!

The pupils enjoyed seeing the ships in the dry docks. They went on to the Ropery, where they used the twisting machines and lots of their energy to make their own piece of rope. The rope was bought back to school and it is hoped it can be made into a lead for our pygmy goats on Larkin Farm. A lasting reminder of a wonderful day at the Historic Dockyard!

Many thanks to everyone at the Dockyard for their support on the day; we felt very well looked after. The staff were very excited too, as it was an unexpected 'Call the Midwife' filming day!







Farm Theme Day









Primary classes enjoyed an 'Autumn and the Environment' farm theme day . Foundation Stage made 'journey sticks'. As they moved to each animal enclosure, pupils looked for sensory items such as feathers, wool, straw and animal feed to add to their journey stick. They also collected different coloured autumn leaves to make a rainbow back in class.

Key Stage 1 were busy moving around the green areas of the farm, collecting a range of natural items that they saw along the way to make a journey crown. The pupils picked up lavender, leaves, sticks and even grass to add to their crowns. They then collected a range of shapes and coloured leaves, and were able to make some leaf animals from their natural materials.

In Key Stage 2, pupils made a photo journey of significant things they walked past whilst in the natural areas of the farm. They collected a range of different coloured, shaped and sized leaves. They used an identification sheet to identify the tree the leaf came from, and then made tree artwork back in their classroom.

They even made some fantastic leaf rubbings too.

All of the pupils enjoyed being outdoors and learning through nature. They enjoyed watching leaves falling from the trees and listening to Autumn songs and poems.

P8 have loved observing the different seasonal changes that have been happening around us. We have used time in our farm slots to explore these changes. We have collected leaves and looked at how their colours have changed and explored the different colours we can see.

P8 have noticed that lots of the leaves have fallen off the trees and are now on the ground. We listened to the sounds the leaves made when we walked over them and kicked them into the air. Pupils also used a leaf identification sheet to try and identify what kind of tree the leaves had come from.











Rights Respecting Schools Award









Abbey Court School is proud to hold the UNICEF Rights Respecting School Gold Award. This is an award that recognises the school's 'commitment and achievement in developing a rights respecting community promoting active global citizenship. Teaching and learning *about, through and for rights* is embedded and sustainable.' The school is reassessed by UNICEF every three years, to ensure that we are still meeting the award's expected high standards.

On Monday 11th November 2024, two of UNICEF's professional advisers visited the school to carry out their assessment. During the visit, the assessors carried out learning walks across the school; met with staff, parents and governors; attended Pupil Voice meetings at Primary, Secondary and Further Education. They also explored the wide range of evidence provided by the school to show how we support learning about, and advocating for, children's rights. It was wonderful to hear about the positive impact of this on children, their families and the local community, and the day was a real celebration of how Abbey Court puts children's rights at the heart of everything we do!

We are eagerly awaiting the final decision and reaccreditation report from UNICEF, and look forward to sharing to sharing this with you soon!

The primary pupils listened to a story about two cats and a monkey in the Tamil language, whilst the secondary pupils cooked some traditional Sri Lankan dishes.

Farm AQAs

Pupils from S1 have been developing the skills required to achieve the AQA award linked to caring for animals on Larkin Farm.

Each week, pupils have completed tasks such as learning how to handle and groom small animals with a range of adult support. In addition, they have explored and prepared food, along with feeding the animals. This helps our pupils to be less fearful of the animals, and gets the animals used to the pupils, too.

They have recently been supported to put on the pygmy goat leads, and learnt to walk with them in preparation for being shown at events across the year by our Young Farmers.

Well done S1—you have all worked hard to achieve this AQA.














Pupils started by researching different pasta types and sauce recipes. They followed a homemade pasta recipe and explored using a pasta machine to make a variety of pasta. Next, S9 decided what ingredients they wanted to use for their pasta dish and the winning vote went to...fusilli pasta! Pupils wrote their shopping lists and went on an educational visit to Morisons to get the ingredients for their dish. S9 went to the polytunnel on the farm to explore the aroma of different herbs, and chose to use oregano in our tomato pasta sauce recipe. Pupils developed their skills and techniques when peeling, grating and chopping different vegetables.

S9 worked fantastically as a team to create their homemade tomato pasta dish, which was enjoyed by all! We can't wait to find out what we will be making next!











Pizzeria

The pupils in the Secondary Department have been exploring the concept of 'farm to fork'. The farm polytunnel had a 'pizza garden' for the pupils to tend to, which included herbs, tomatoes, peppers and many other vegetables. The pupils in Key Stage 3 and 4 researched and investigated different types of pizza, and planned how to make their own class pizzas.

It was great to see so many parents come to taste our different pizzas and vote for their favourite.

Medications Administered at School

For pupils that require daily/emergency meds at school:

- Please return the completed and signed Medication Permission Form.
- Please send in a new supply of medication in the original pharmacy package, with a prescription label attached.
- Please supply the appropriate syringe or spoon for your child's medication.
- Please refer to the patient information leaflet, as some medications will expire after opening, sooner than the expiry date on the box.
- For medications administered by gastrostomy: please ensure an enteral syringe for each medication is supplied every 2 weeks, along with a 60ml syringe for flushes and a new extension tube.

Key Stage 3 and 4 Horseriding

Each week, a group of pupils attend horseriding lessons at the Arrow Riding Centre.

The pupils cope really well when wearing their riding hats, and follow direction from a trained riding instructor. They have learnt to mount and dismount a horse safely. They have been developing their steering skills by moving their reins in the correct direction, and some have attempted to use their knees to steer, too. Over the term, they have also been walking and stopping their ponies on command.

The most recent sessions have been using those skills as part of a walk through the woods. It was fantastic to see the pupils riding in an outdoor setting and putting their new found skills to the test. Well done everyone, and thank you for the team at Arrow – including their fabulous volunteers.









Visit to Church F Toucan Theatre













S10 visited St Philip and St James' Church in Upnor. We explored some of the key features of the church, including the font, pulpit, altar, lectern, organ and war memorial. We particularly liked the embroidered kneeling cushions and the stained-glass windows. During the visit, we listened to the sound of the organ playing and walked along the aisle to the wedding song.

This educational visit enabled us to have a real-life experience of the learning that had taken place in class during RE lessons, about churches.



This term, Toucan Theatre collaborated with Abbey Court on an exciting new project funded by the Arts Council. Pupils took part in multi-sensory theatre workshops to create SEND and PMLD storytelling of a new show, 'The Noisy Dinosaur'!

We explored what dinosaurs looked like, where they lived, how they behaved and the noises they made. The workshops gave us opportunities to explore, create and immerse ourselves in storytelling and performance.

Next year, Toucan Theatre will return to Abbey Court

to perform 'The Noisy Dinosaur', so that our school can see the impact we had on the creation and design of the show.

What is so exciting about being involved in Abbey Court School is that, for our young people every Christmas, it is the very best they ever had. It is all about memories made.



The choir attended the Medway Music Association Carol Concert at Rochester Cathedral on 5th December. The pupils in the choir joined with pupils from other local Medway schools to sing a mix of traditional and modern carols. The pupils watched and followed a conductor, and joined in enthusiastically. Each school was allocated a reading to deliver to help narrate the Christmas story and introduce the songs.

The pupils engaged fully with the experience and were in awe of the beautiful backdrop of the cathedral.

A Christingle begins with an orange...

On Tuesday 10th of December in school, and on Wednesday 11th at All Saints Church, all primary pupils had the opportunity to attend a Christingle service.

The pupils made their own Christingles in class and took these to the services, where they learnt about Christingle and what it means.

The orange represents the world, the red ribbon symbolises the love and blood of Christ, the sweets and dried fruit represent all of God's creations, and the lit candle represents Jesus' light in the world, bringing hope to people living in darkness.

The pupils engaged well, singing our Christingle songs and lighting their candles for a moment of reflection. Well done to all the pupils and many thanks to the church for leading the services!







Christmas Cakes!







During Term 2, S6 made their own Christmas cakes to take home, but with a slight twist. Instead of cooking them in a cake tin, we made them in baked bean tins!

We used a symbolized ingredient list to ensure we had the correct measurements and all of the ingredients. We also used a symbolised sequence list to help us follow the stages of the recipe. S6 learnt health and safety precautions, such as washing our hands and tying long hair back.

We prepared our tins by drawing a circle shape around the tin on baking paper, and then cut a long rectangular piece of baking paper to grease the tin. We practised using weighing scales to measure the correct amount. There were numerous spoon skills required, including creaming, mixing and scooping.

All of S6 worked hard to create a product they were proud to send home!

Carols on the Farm










On 15th December, we held our annual 'Carols on the Farm' event.






















What is Makaton?

Makaton is a unique language programme that uses symbols, signs and speech to enable people to communicate.

It supports the development of essential communication skills, such as attention and listening, comprehension, memory, recall, and organisation of language and expression.

We all use visual supports throughout our days to support our understanding.

They are an effective way to stop repeating ourselves when it comes to supporting a pupil to do a task. When we repeat ourselves verbally, we extend the pupils' processing time, which can lead to frustration.


We use a range of visual supports in school to help pupils to understand and follow routines:

- Objects of Reference
- Symbols, photos and written words
- Lists, sequencing cards
- Communication boards and books
- 'Now and Next' boards
- ◆ TEACCH Approach
- Visual Timetables.

Visual supports also promote independence skills, such as providing a shopping list to follow, sequencing the steps to prepare a meal, and following an individual timetable to know what is happening next.

Hannah Wright — Farm Assistant Hi, my name is Hannah and I have


recently joined the team on Larkin Farm.
