World Book Day 2025



Primary

This years World Book Day theme was 'Read Your Way', and in the Primary department, the pupils love Sensory Stories.

Pupils excitedly joined the online interactive story telling session, from the founder of Rhyming Multi-Sensory Stories. As the story was told, they were engaging with a variety of props.

Pupils then turned some of their favourite stories into sensory stories, including The Gruffalo, We're Going on a Bear Hunt and Charlie and the Chocolate Factory.











Secondary

To promote this year's World Book Day theme 'Read Your Way', pupils in the Secondary department explored reading Charlie and the Chocolate Factory by Roald Dahl in different formats.

They enjoyed the story by audiobook, as a story massage, the sensory story version, as well as reading the actual book.

The idea behind this was to help the pupils to find a way of reading that suited them.

This term, pupil artists have investigated painting and drawing from life.

In collaboration with Caroline, our horse riding instructor, pupils studied Tonto's features, such as his blankets, harnesses, ears, mane and tail.

Pupils studied the drawing techniques of artists such as Franz Marc and George Stubbs, who were inspired by the horse, as well as looking at prehistoric cave painting from the Lascaux Cave in France.

The fantastic portraits will be exhibited in the school, so that everyone can vote for their favourite artwork.

The winners will receive a rosette and be exhibited outside Tonto's room, for everyone to enjoy.











SALT Workshops

Parent Workshops are run by the in-house SALT team three times a year. These workshops are a chance to catch up with other parents, the in-house SALT team and find out more about different approaches that may be useful to their children, and are used in school throughout the day.

They usually entail a small informal presentation about the topic of the workshop that is discussed over a drink and a biscuit!

They are a forum to ask general questions, rather than to discuss individual pupils, as they are designed to be a place to share information about the different approaches that are useful.

We look forward to seeing you at the next workshop in Summer Term 6, where the topic will be Communication Books and Boards.






Language of the Term

S6 have enjoyed learning to use lots of different instruments.
















Choral Festival

Having this opportunity is an important part in our exposure to, and experiences of music. It helps developing our love of, understanding and skills in music across genres and instruments.









Spring Theme Day



On 18th March, the Secondary and Further Education departments took part in a 'Spring Theme Day'.

Classes were busy completing activities on the farm, in classes and in outside areas. All Key Stages enjoyed going on a Spring walk on the farm to find signs of spring, using checklists, taking photographs and videos.

Key Stage 3 pupils made flower displays using recycled materials. They also made wild seed bombs, which were scattered in different places on the farm to add colour, variety, and to support wildlife this spring. Key Stage 4 pupils created spring collages on a canvas, after being inspired by their spring walk on the farm.

Students in Further Education went to a garden centre to explore a range of plants. They then planned, designed and created beautiful planters in their cafe courtyard.

A fantastic effort was made by everyone, well done.
















Horse Riding Theme Day



Primary pupils visited the ponies on the farm to understand the type of equipment that is used to ride a horse. We are thrilled to be able to share with you that Larkin Farm now proudly holds the

Council for Learning Outside the Classroom's Quality Badge. Over the past two years we have been working hard to develop our farm outreach offer. This means that we strive to provide a high-quality learning environment where local schools and colleges can bring their pupils to enhance their learning. This has been a highly valued service to many local schools who do not have access to outdoor spaces and the learning opportunities this brings. As well as supporting the local community and Medway children, it also opens up a range of inclusion opportunities for our pupils, who have been able to work alongside their mainstream peers on shared projects such as growing and planting.

The LOtC Quality Badge demonstrates that we have been through a rigorous process to check that all essential health and safety policies are in place to ensure all children are able access our farm safely. The assessment also involved a quality assurance visit to see the wonderful learning that takes place at Larkin Farm. We are really proud to now hold this badge, which means we can continue to share our provision with Medway children and young people.

So, what's next?

We are committed to offering daily outdoor learning opportunities to our pupils and recognise it as a key part of everyone's learning. Therefore, we have begun working towards the LOtC Quality Mark which recognises schools' commitment to all types of outdoor learning. We look forward to working towards this award and will keep you updated on our progress!

Abbey Court School employs three Health Care Assistants (known as HCAs), who support the health and welfare needs of pupils. This enables pupils to maximise their educational experience. The HCAs work closely with pupils, school, parents/carers and the NHS MCH Special School Nursing Team.

What do they do?

- Support pupils and staff in class teams to meet pupils' health needs;
- Work closely with the NHS MCH Special School Nursing Team;
- Speak with parents regarding their child's medications, if required;
- Sign in/out all medications that come in to school on a daily basis;
- Help with the preparation and administration of medication that goes out on educational visits:
- Support the administration of medication for pupils on residentials;
- Administer daily and emergency medications as needed, and can help with pupils' gastrostomy care and feeds:
- Carry out routine weight and height measurements for pupils who require this;
- Support the immunisations team when they come in to school;
- Provide information and resources to class teams about health related matters to support pupils, including on hand washing, teeth cleaning, personal hygiene, toileting, healthy eating and exercise, to name but a few!
- In addition, the HCAs all hold a paediatric first aid qualification.

Many pupils visit the HCAs every day. The HCAs (who were previously highly experienced Teaching Assistants at the school) therefore build strong, trusting relationships with pupils, by communicating effectively with them and making them feel comfortable when they need to visit the Medical Room.

It was a truly unforgettable experience that built confidence, teamwork, and a love for the arts.




Let's talk Makaton

WELCOME TO OUR NEW STAFF!




Robin Kochapillil — Catering Assistant
