DO YOU THINK YOUR CHILD MAY BE ELIGIBLE FOR FREE SCHOOL MEALS? Children are entitled to receive free school meals if they or their parents or guardians receive any of the benefits below: -

- Income Support income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- ncome-related Employment and Support Allowance support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999 the guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Norking Tax Credit run-on paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit if you apply on or after 1 April 2018 your household income must be less than E7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get)

Pupils under the compulsory school age who are in full time education may also be able to get free

Strood Gardening Club Competition

Further Education students explored 'bug hotels' for Strood Gardening Club's competition themed on the 'Pont Du Gard' aqueduct in France.

As part of Design Technology, students learnt about identifying natural materials in their environment, and how to use tools safely and effectively.

Through Science and the ASDAN Environment Award, they explored how they could improve the environment for wildlife, learning what insects they might see and what they needed to breed and hibernate.

Students really enjoyed this project, and understood how important it was to look after insects, especially over the winter months.

We were 'highly commended', and were awarded a medal and some wild flower seeds.

Language of the Term


Our language of the term is Romanian.

We are all very proud of their efforts!








Secondary Sports Week
















Further Education enjoyed their visit to Chart Hill Lakes to experience Coarse and Carp Fishing this term.

Does your child travel to school on SEN Transport?



You only need to reapply for Medway SEN Transport this year if your child is moving from Primary to Secondary, or from Secondary to the Further Education Department.

Communication Corner

Here are some easy ways to build vocabulary, and develop communication skills over the summer holidays, whilst having fun!

Build a child's vocabulary with these types of Words:

Core Words - such as 'more', 'stop', 'help', 'different', 'look', 'want', 'like', 'don't like'.

Nouns - the names of things, such as foods and animals.

Verbs - action words such as 'kick', 'eat' and 'walk'.

Names - such as family members and pets.

Social words - greetings such as 'hi' and 'bye'.

Useful strategies that you can do while you are at home:

Naming: Name different actions or objects during play and daily routines so that your child learns the names of things around them.

Commenting: Talk about what you and your child are doing, looking at, playing with, touching or eating. Use short phrases and repeat the key words.

Following their lead: Talk about, and play with the things your child is playing with. Respond to your child's interactions and interests. Model or copy your child's actions, words, or sounds.

Copy and add: If your child has started to use single words, you can build their vocabulary by repeating back what they have said and adding another word.

Say it again and again: Children learn best with repetition. Repeat key words over and over again during play and daily routines, such as "up, up, up the stairs".

We look forward to hearing all about the lovely things you get up to over the Summer!

Remember to always say the word when you are Makaton signing. Use your dominant hand to sign slowly and to the length of the word.



























What is Makaton?

Makaton is a unique language programme that uses symbols, signs and speech to enable people to communicate.

It supports the development of essential communication skills, such as attention and listening, comprehension, memory, recall, and organisation of language and expression.
